Attached you will find the Waupaca Police Department Annual report for 2012.

Overall, you will find that Waupaca's reported crime rate decreased by approximately 3% from 2011 based on our Uniform Crime Reporting statistics whereas our clearance remains higher than the State average..


The total budget for police operations in 2012 was \$1,530,997. Actual expenditures came to \$1,499,913; about \$31,084 under budget, or approximately -2.03%. Revenue collected in 2012 was \$132,610, an increase of about 7.5%.

On the whole, police calls, citations and arrests increased by approximately 13.9%. Overall, incidents increased 12.3%, criminal arrests decreased by 12.3%, and citations increased by 28.5%. Overall property loss due to theft decreased 5.5%. Recovered stolen property was approximately 15%, below the statewide average of 27%

In 2013, the Waupaca Police Department will complete the security system upgrades as required by CJIS (Criminal Justice Information Service). This will finalize the process that began several years ago when CJIS updated their security policy as it relates to the wireless transfer of data, mainly our mobile CAD units and Badger Tracs (electronic citation program).

In 2012, the Waupaca Police Department became the first department in the County to equip a squad car for the use of propane. Propane is proven to emit fewer pollutants into the air and is considerable less expensive than unleaded fuel, however, due to its lower density, burns at a quicker rate. It is still expected to produce some fuel savings over the course of the year. At this time, we are proceeding with equipping a second squad car with a propane conversion kit for additional savings.

Dear Representatives,

In 2012, the Waupaca Police Department addressed the staffing need of hiring a new part time patrol officer as Sherry Weise resigned to take a full time position with the Waupaca County Department of Human Services. The Department hired Wesley S. Zube to fill the position and he recently completed his field training program. Officer Zube is a life long resident of the Waupaca area and I am confident he will represent the department with a high degree of professionalism and integrity.



All sworn officers are mandated by state standards to annually complete 24 hours of training to maintain their certification. The department encourages officers to seek specialized training although training is conducted based on the needs of the department and officers. The department currently has 3 officers who are certified instructors trained in specialized fields such as vehicle contacts and firearms training. The department will look to add an officer to teach defense and arrest tactics and emergency vehicle operations.

The Waupaca Police Department participated in the U.U. Department of Justice, Bulletproof Vest Partnership. Since 1999, the BVP program has reimbursed more than 13,000 jurisdictions, a total of \$277 million in federal funds for the purchase of over one million vests (1,084,081 as of October 17, 2012). BVP is a critical resource for state and local jurisdictions that saves lives. Based on data collected and recorded by BJA staff, in FY 2012, protective vests were directly attributable to saving the lives of at least 33 law enforcement and corrections officers, in 20 different states, an increase 13.7% over FY 2011. At least 13 of those life-saving vests had been purchased, in part, with BVP funds. In 2012, the Police Department was able to purchase 3 protective vests with funds totaling \$960. To date, the Waupaca Police Department has received \$5,709.50 in vest grant money.



The Waupaca Police Department received a \$15,000.00 Click It or Ticket Grant in 2012 and throughout the year issued a total of 667 citations related to safety belt violations. Officer Diana Flatoff was recognized by the Wisconsin State Patrol – Bureau of Transportation Safety with an appreciation award for her efforts with the 2012 Click It or Ticket Campaign. Officer Flatoff along

with all the officers of the police department work very hard at traffic safety enforcement within the community. I appreciate the officers' hard work and effort as special enforcement projects involve working hours beyond their normal work schedule.

On June 20th, 2012 every member of the Waupaca Police Department signed the Oath of Honor, which was developed by the International Association of Chief's of Police. The Oath of Honor is a reminder to all our members of our duty to uphold integrity within our department. Integrity is the cornerstone of effective policing and our citizens must be able to trust in us for us to perform successfully in our community. Members of our department are committed to performing their duties with the highest ethical standards and values in policing.

On behalf of all the dedicated professionals of the Waupaca Police Department, I would like to express our sincere gratitude to the members of the Police Commission, Mayor Brian Smith and the Common Council for their continued support.

2012 Crime Investigative Report

In the Spring of 2012, there was a reported robbery at Stratton's Drug Store. The suspect told the pharmacist she had a gun and wanted narcotics. The suspect left with the narcotics and without harming anyone. A search warrant was served in the City of Waupaca of a person of interest; however, no physical evidence could be located.

In the fall of 2012, the City of Waupaca, City of Manawa, and the townships surrounding the City of Waupaca experienced a rash of bar burglaries. Departments believed all the cases were related. An investigators meeting was called and held at the City of Waupaca Police Department inviting all agencies in Waupaca County to share information about the burglaries they were investigating. The evening after the meeting, City of Waupaca officers and deputies from the Waupaca County Sheriff's Department responded to a burglar alarm at Nelson's Strike Zone. When officers arrived, a suspect was seen leaving the building. He was subsequently taken into custody and transported to the Waupaca County Jail. Search warrants were served the following morning in the City of Waupaca and the City of Manawa. Thousands of dollars of stolen merchandise was recovered in the City of Waupaca and thousands of dollars of stolen merchandise was recovered in the City of Manawa. After lengthy interviews, the two suspects confessed to the bar burglaries that were being investigated along with residential burglaries and thefts from vehicle's. One of the suspects was charged with a total of thirty charges which included Burglary, Theft, Burglary-Arming self with Dangerous Weapon, Carrying a Concealed Weapon, and Criminal Damage to Property. The other suspect was charged with a total of twenty six counts that included the charges listed above. This investigation remains active with thousands of dollars of merchandise that is being held at the Waupaca Police Department and Manawa Police Department.


In November of 2012, officers from the City of Waupaca Police Department responded to a burglary alarm at K-mart. After a brief investigation, they were able to determine someone had forcibly entered the building. A short time later, officers arrested two male juveniles. Their charges included Burglary, Theft, and Criminal Damage to Property.

The City of Waupaca Police Department continues to be part of the Central Wisconsin Drug Task Force. The task force was developed so that departments could operate collaboratively between multiple jurisdictions. Members of the task force then formulate plans to combat drug trafficking. Plans include making controlled buys, and monitoring persons, houses, or property for suspected drug activity. The task force uses equipment that is bought, funded by grants, or seized to assist in their investigations. Members of the task force use search warrants and subpoenas to assist in their investigations to make arrests.


The agencies involved in the task force are Waupaca Police Department, Waupaca County Sheriff's Department, Waushara County Sheriff's Department, Stevens Point Police Department, Portage County Sheriff's Department, Wood County Sheriff's Department, Wisconsin Rapids Police Department, Marshfield Police Department, Berlin Police Department, Green Lake County Sheriff's Department, Juneau County Sheriff's Department, Adams County Sheriff's Department, Marquette County Sheriff's Department, Plover Police Department and Grand Rapids Police Department.

In 2012, the City of Waupaca Police Department investigated 61 drug complaints that resulted in 85 arrests. There were 71 total adult arrests that included 17 felony counts, 21 misdemeanor counts, and 33 municipal citations. There were also 14 juvenile arrests that included 4 felony counts, 7 juvenile referrals and 11 municipal citations. Those charges include Possession of Marijuana w/intent to Deliver, Manufacture of Marijuana, Manufacture of Schedule 1 or II Drug, Possession w/in 1000 feet of a school, Possession of Narcotic Drugs, Possession of Marijuana, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia under 17, Possession of Synthetic Marijuana, Illegally Possessing a

Prescription, and Uttering a Forged Prescription. Other crimes related to these offenses were Bail Jumping, Obstruction of Justice, Theft of Moveable Property, and Entry into a Locked Vehicle.



Because of the ongoing problems with prescription medication, the Waupaca Police Department and health care professionals have been working and training together to reduce the incidents involving prescription theft, abuse, and sales. Training was held at Riverside Medical Center and presented by members of the Central Wisconsin Drug Task Force that informed doctors, nurses, and administration of the new trends with prescription drugs. In 2012 there were 16 reported prescription thefts which is a reduction from 2011 when there were 33. The graph below depicts prescription drug complaints from 2007, 2008, 2009, 2010, 2011, and 2012. From 2011 to 2012 there was a 48% reduction in reported crimes.



From January 1, 2012 thru December 31, 2012 there were seventeen voluntary withdrawals that were drug related offenses from the Waupaca High School and four voluntary withdrawals from the Waupaca Middle School. Eleven students at the high school were found with marijuana, three students were in possession of prescription medication without a doctor's authorization, and three students were in possession marijuana

and prescription medication without a doctor's authorization. The four students at the middle school were in possession of marijuana.

Students are allowed to reapply and enroll back into the school district; however, they have to complete sixty hours of community service, meet with AODA Counselors, and complete three academic courses at home.

2012 Department Programs & Services

In 2012 the Waupaca Police Department continued a proactive approach to police work through community based programs and services. These programs and services are designed to educate the public in an effort to limit victimization and encourage community involvement to prevent future crime.

A primary component of our education and prevention efforts starts with the youth and our collaboration with the School system. Liaison Officer Rodenz is assigned to the Waupaca School system. Throughout 2012 Officer Rodenz instructed various educational programs to students designed to encourage interaction among law enforcement, students,

A core program which Officer Rodenz taught during 2012 is Counteract. The program was taught to seven classes in the 4th, 5th and 6th grade level focusing on the harm of alcohol and drugs. The program additionally teaches children alternatives to resist peer pressure. Officer Rodenz also taught an internet safety program to 7th grade students with a focus on predators within the internet world. Officer Rodenz additionally presented programs to high school students on the dangers of drugs and alcohol, landlord tenant issues and a sexual assault/safety prevention class.





The Waupaca Police Department continued its participation in the Quick 50 program which is sponsored by the Waupaca County Crime Stoppers. The purpose of the program is to increase safety in our schools by encouraging students to report such things as weapons, drugs or alcohol. A fifty dollar reward is paid to students who provide information leading to an arrest. In 2012, Officer Rodenz received seven Quick 50 tips which resulted in information leading to an arrest.



Technology and the access of personal information through the internet has contributed to the prevalence of internet fraud in our society. Waupaca is not immune to these types of complaints which can be difficult to investigate as the perpetrators often reside in a different state or another Country. In an effort to educate and limit potential victims of fraud, Sergeant Hoelzel gave three identity theft and scam presentations throughout the year.

In the months of January through September the Waupaca Police Department participated in a Click it or Ticket grant sponsored by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation. The grants objective was to achieve seatbelt compliance with an ultimate goal of safer traveling conditions for all operators and passengers in motor vehicles. Officers worked 164hrs of overtime during the grant and 99hrs of straight time. During the grant, Officers issued 332 citations for seatbelt violations along with various other warnings and citations as depicted by the graph below.





Also in 2012, Officer Benitez continued the Waupaca Most Wanted web site. The site is updated on a regular basis showing subjects from the local area having warrants for their arrest. The site is located on Waupaca's official web site and is also featured in the court section of the Waupaca County Post. In 2012, there were 105 people with outstanding warrants removed from the site as a result of an arrest or satisfaction of bond.

Two presentations on bullying and child safety were also given to the local Cub Scout troop. The presentations were given by Sergeant Hoelzel and emphasized methods to cope with bullying and strangers who approach children.

In April of 2012 the Waupaca Police Department participated in a prescription drug turn in. This initiative addresses a vital public safety and health issue which has in recent years overwhelmed our community as well as others. The program offers citizens an opportunity to prevent drug abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous prescription drugs as well as a safe means of disposal.

WAUPACA COUNTY SWAT

Police response to an unusual emergency situation often requires specialized tactical units trained and equipped to take effective action. The Waupaca County Swat Team is designated for these types of situations. The primary goal of this unit is to contain, control, and resolve these situations as effectively and efficiently as possible while protecting life and minimizing the risk of injury to all persons involved.

The Waupaca County Swat Team is comprised of law enforcement S.W.A.T. officers throughout the county of Waupaca. A (S.W.A.T.) Operator is an officer who is trained in Specialized Weapons And Tactics. Law Enforcement Depts compiling the Waupaca County Swat Team are the Waupaca P. D., Waupaca County Sheriff's Dept., Clintonville P. D., New London P. D., and the Iola P. D. Currently there are 16 Swat operators that comprise two teams (GRAY Team and BLUE Team). The Waupaca P. D. SWAT operators are Sergeant Mario Graceffa and Officer Josh Krueger. In 2012 Sergeant Mario Graceffa was promoted to Assistant Team Leader.

The Waupaca County Swat Team will respond for deployment when ordered out by proper authority for the purpose of controlling non-routine/high risk incidents. Swat will provide a coordinated police response in situations where non-routine police action is required. Swat may be used if requested for the execution of high-risk warrants that may pose a danger to innocent persons or police personnel.

April, 2012 Waupaca Swat conducted an Active Shooter Training Scenario at the Manawa School District.

May, 2012 Waupaca Swat conducted an Active Shooter Training Scenario at the Marion School District.

May, 2012 Waupaca Swat attended Mutual Aid Deployment Scenario based training at University of Wisconsin Stevens Point. Utilizing the UWSP campus, several active shooter scenarios were held. Members of the Stevens Point Police Department, Stevens Point Fire & Rescue, Portage and Wood County Emergency Response Units participated in the mutual aid training day.

May, 2012 Waupaca Swat was called out for an armed subject in the township of Mukwa, outside of the New London City Limits. Waupaca County Deputies were responding to a mental/welfare check on a male subject when gun shots were fired at the deputies as they approached the subjects drive way. Waupaca Swat was called out to breach the house and search the woodlands for the armed subject. The suspect ultimately surrendered to the state police without further incident.

August, 2012 Waupaca Swat conducted Active Shooter training at the Weyauwega High School.

November, 2012 Waupaca Swat was activated to execute a narcotics search warrant at a residence in Manawa. After execution of the warrant two suspects were taken into custody for related narcotic possession/delivery offenses. Illegal narcotics were seized as evidence during the warrant search.

In addition to the calls for service the Waupaca Swat Team maintains a vigorous training schedule. The Waupaca Swat Operators trained monthly in several tactical areas. Swat Operators train for scenarios in hostage rescue, active shooters, barricaded subjects, negotiations, and executions of warrants. The majority of the Swat Operators are State Certified Instructors in several police disciplines.

2012 Budget Summary

Though the city's 2012 population is estimated at 6,040 much of the area's population lives outside the city limits in surrounding townships. The Waupaca area supports a service area of over 30,000 people within a 15 mile radius of the city. Waupaca serves as the county seat encompassing approximately 8.01 square miles and has about 47.03 miles of roads.¹

The 2012 Budget for the Waupaca Police Department was \$1,530,997, broken down into 7 different areas or “programs”, including Police Administration, Police Patrol, Clerical, Drug Enforcement, School Liaison, School Patrol and Parking Enforcement. Table 1 depicts the actual budget for specific programs for 2012. In 2012, the Police Department came in under budget by 2.03%, or approximately \$31,084.



2012 Revenue Summary

The total revenue generated by the Waupaca Police Department in 2012 was **\$132,610**, an increase of approximately 7.5% over 2011. 

Police Department 2012 Incident Analysis

The Police Department tracks every call an Officer is called to, including all self initiated field activity (SIFA). Table 4 depicts the yearly summaries with a percentage depicted for each category shown in Figure 3. This depicts an increase in Incidents of 5% when compared with 2010. A summary of each category is as follows:

Assist: General citizen assists to include assisting EMS, FIRE, businesses, motorists (i.e. lockouts), and assisting other agencies.

Criminal: All calls related to criminal activity, such as burglaries, thefts, drug offenses, and domestic disturbances.

General: This category includes a variety of services, including animal complaints, delivery of council and other legal notices, follow up investigations, and community presentations.

Ordinance: General ordinance violations, such as animal complaints, disturbances, bad checks, truancy, and permit violations.

Service: General service related calls, such as missing persons, special patrols, and warrant arrests.

Traffic: All traffic related calls, such as speeding, OWI, school zone enforcement, traffic direction, and accident investigation.



2012 Property Loss Analysis

The total property loss (theft) for 2012 was reported at \$50,029, and the amount of stolen property recovered was \$7,626, or approximately 15.2%. In 2011, the statewide recovery rate average was 27%². Figure 4 depicts a property loss analysis over the past 6 years. Based on this graph, you can see that the Waupaca Police Department is generally consistently higher with recovery rates than the statewide average.



Uniform Crime Reporting Summary

The Federal Bureau of Investigation's Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program, which began in 1929, collects information on the following crimes reported to law enforcement authorities: homicide, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson.

In 2012, The WPD saw a 3% decrease in UCR Crimes from 261 in 2011 to 253.













Figure 10 depicts the annual number of citations issued while Figure 11 depicts a percentage breakdown of all traffic citations issued in 2012.



Figure 14 depicts a percentage breakdown of the total number of parking citations issued in 2012, and Table 6 shows a comparison of citations issued over the past 5 year period.



STAFFING LEVELS

In terms of Wisconsin averages, there were 2.2 sworn officers per 1,000 residents, 1.1 civilians per 1,000 residents and 3.3 total employees per 1,000 residents, based on 2012 averages⁴. Nationwide, the average was 2.38 sworn officers per 1,000 residents⁵. The number of employees per 1,000 is related to a variety of factors including crime level, geographic coverage, size of agency, and budgetary issues.





As of December 31, 2012, The Waupaca Police Department employed 14 full time sworn officers, and 1.5 full time civilian employees. Based on current population of 6,040, Waupaca has 2.32 sworn officers per 1,000 residents, and .17 civilians per 1,000 with a total of 2.48 employees per 1,000 residents, which is below the state average of 3.3 employees per 1,000 residents, and the national average of 2.81. Figure 12 depicts the National average, State of Wisconsin average, and the actual number of officers employed per 1,000 residents for the City of Waupaca, whereas figure 13 depicts total employee averages.
